WATER MONITORING PLAN

Each year The Minnesota Lakes Association and Rivers Council of Minnesota select approximately six lakes to participate in the Citizen Volunteer Water Quality Monitoring Plan Training. Lobster Lake Association submitted an application and

was selected. Training will be September 22 and 23, 2006. Research shows that many citizen monitoring programs collect data-but stumble when it comes to using data. This program helps the association focus on goals and create a plan that makes a monitoring program more efficient and effective. A stipend is available to us if the monitoring plan is implemented. 2005 WALLEYE STOCKING

Stocking was done again in 2005 by the DNR. A total of 1300 pounds of walleye fingerlings or 2600 walleyes were stocked in Lobster Lake last fall. **Bruce Strandsko** and **Brad Meichsner** will be meeting in February 2006 with Dean Beck of the DNR to discuss further stocking in 2006 and the possibility of other programs for our lake.

LOBSTER LAKE MANAGEMENT PLAN

In 2004 The Lobster Lake Association participated in the Healthy Lakes and Rivers partnership sponsored by the Central Minnesota Initiative Foundation. A visioning and planning workshop was held. Information from this meeting was used to develop realistic goals and action plans for the lake plan. The entire plan was discussed at our annual meeting last May. **LLA received a \$5,000.00 grant to be used to carry out the objectives in the plan.** Last summer we had a very good signup of volunteers to work on the various projects, but we need a lot more.

coming summer more volunteers will be given instructions and equipment to do additional searches. The goal is to cover all 13 miles of shoreline at least twice a year in May and September.

Land & Resource Updates

As an effort to better understand the County and the decisions they make regarding lake shore issues, Bonnie Huettl has been and will continue to attend the weekly Commissioners meetings and the Planning Commission meetings. It is important to keep abreast of the changes happening in the County and the pressures placed upon our beloved lakes as development occurs. This does NOT mean no development but rather responsible development. Currently underway are changes being made to the Minor Subdivision rules affecting riparian lots. Any lot touching any water MUST come before the Planning Commission for review. Currently there are ways around it and that must change. The Development Review Team (DRT) meets to review new plats but minor subdivisions are exempt. This is where the public (i.e. associations) has input.

At this time Bonnie is writing a Surface Water Restriction Ordinance for Eiesland Slough. (see related article) The 20 acres of land on Beauty Pt Rd is being developed into a 4 lot subdivision. They are all riparian lots. This water flows directly into Lobster Lake and according to Dean Beck at the DNR motor propellers will substantially degrade the water quality by redistributing sediment in this shallow water. Any boats will cause a problem.

The County is still searching for a L& R Director so Community Growth Institute is helping out by attending all of the variance and conditional use permits sites, and all new plats presented. They will also continue to review and rewrite ordinances as needed. Ben Oleson from CGI is our contact. Any questions call

WATER QUALITY MONITORING

We had a lot of water quality monitoring activities going on this past summer, and fortunately many new volunteers to participate. Some of the activities we were doing last summer were:

- Taking Secchi disk readings weekly at four sites on the lake from June to mid September. Hardy Huettl, who has taken Secchi disk readings for the last three years was again taking readings in the West Bay and Mike and Melody O'Leary were taking readings in the East Bay.
- Collecting water samples for chlorophyll-A and phosphorus at one location and take Secchi disk readings at all four locations. This is done monthly from May through September. The samples are sent to a lab in Detroit Lakes for processing. You can see the results by visiting the lab's web site: http://www.rmbel.info>
- Collecting water samples and taking Secchi disk readings in both the East and West bays. Partially processing the samples in **Richard Knutson's** white glove clean room (his shop) and delivered to Douglas County Soil and Water Conservation District. We did this six times last summer; the samples and data got delivered directly to MPCA. We also measured water temperature vs. depth at the two locations. Richard Knutson's pontoon boat provided the transportation. **Ron Hofstedt**, **Pete Onstad** and Hardy Huettl along with Richard usually made the trip.

This summer we may also be monitoring the stream inlets and outlets to/from our lake. We are always looking for volunteers to help with our monitoring activities.

Within a few months we hope to have a lot of the water quality data available for everyone to see on our new web site **www.lobsterlake.org**

CENTRAL LAKES REGION SANITARY DISTRICT (CLRSD)

On July 31st a public hearing was held to explain the details of the sewer project with more than 300 people in attendance. Following the public meeting all six townships in the CLRSD sewer district (Moe, LaGrande, Miltona, Leaf Valley, Carlos and Brandon) needed to review the effect of the sewer district on their respective township based on the information presented at the public hearing.

The Boards of all six townships approved the project proposal. Carlos, Leaf Valley, Miltona and approved the project with no changes. Brandon Township approved the project as proposed for the property owners on Chippewa Lake, but excluded Whiskey and Devils Lakes and the connecting areas which were part of the original proposal. Moe Township added the back lots to the sewer district. The project engineers are assessing what impact the changes will have on the cost of the project. At the CLRSD monthly meeting on December 1, the Board voted to proceed with the project.


Quoting from an article in the December 14, 2005 edition of the *Echo Press*: "Construction on the project could begin in 2007- the 'best-case scenario,' Haggenmiller said – and be completed in 2010. Connections to the system could begin as early as 2008." (Jerry Haggenmiller is the chairperson of CLRSD.)

The new system will be funded using a three pronged approach: special assessments, user fees and property tax increases. The CLRSD has signed a letter of intent to connect with the Alexandria Lakes Area Sanitary District (ALASD). A formal request is expected to be made late winter or early spring. At the present time the Board is reviewing project costs, meeting with other potential participants and looking at various means of obtaining grants, low interest loans etc. The board encourages all potential users to contact members of the State and Federal governments to encourage them to help provide funding for the project. In addition, the Board is working with Land and Resource Management to determine what can be done to assist property owners that are planning to build before hookup or those that may need a septic system updated. Great effort has been put forth by local lake associations, water coalition groups and our own Douglas County "Protect Water Now" program to protect our beloved lakes, rivers and streams. It is prudent at this time for Douglas County Commissioners to enact a **Surface Water Use Ordinance No Motors** on *Eiesland Slough*.

Eiesland Slough is located entirely within the boundaries of Douglas County specifically S $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 26, Tract 128N, Range 39W of Moe Township. The Department of Natural Resources has classified this body of water as an NES Lake. This classification sets forth the greatest restriction on a lake. The definition of a NES Lake is; usually less than 150 acres total, less than 60 acres per mile of shoreline, and less than three dwellings per mile of shoreline. Such lakes may have some winter kill of fish; may have shallow, swampy shoreline and are less than 15 feet deep." All of these are true regarding Eiesland Slough. It is 47-66 acres in size depending on yearly precipitation. The level of the water remains stable despite the temporary variations. The depth varies from 4 feet to 7 feet with 40% of it being 5 feet or less. There are two culverts for water flow one located at the inlet from Round Lake (id 21-197) also a NES Lake, and the other at the west side outlet to Lobster Lake (id 21-144 RDS lake). Due to the shallow nature of the lake, the entire bottom is muck and decayed organic matter. There is some sandy shore at the cattle crossing between Round and Eiesland. Care needs to be taken with this water as the degradation of this water affects Lobster Lake as it flows directly into it. The bay it flows into is already compromised with shallow, mucky bottom and algae blooms abundant in the summer. Any additional degraded water will greatly affect Lobster and deter the Lobster Lake Association's, Lake Management Plan for maintaining clean water. The association has voluntarily initiated water quality testing to be monitored by the EPA to define how cleaner water can be accomplished. There is a need for a No Motor restriction on Eiesland. According to Dean Beck of the DNR "propeller wash of outboard motors has significant potential to physically degrade the water quality by re-suspending the accumulated sediment causing algae blooms. In my opinion, operation of motorized watercraft on Eiesland Slough can be reasonably projected to have undesirable environmental impacts regardless of boat speed or motor size". This along with the current proposed development on 20 acres of the east shore makes this ordinance a timely decision to protect this virgin water.

On December 20, 2005, a preliminary plat was approved by DC Planning Commission for the 20 acres of the east most parcel number 45-0443-320 to be developed. "Eiesland View" will consist of 4 riparian lots. When developed, there will be a greater need to protect this sensitive water body by restricting motor use on this lake. It is important to pass this ordinance in a timely manner to ensure potential buyers of "Eiesland View", prior to entering into an agreement to purchase, that there are restrictions in place.

The benefit of this ordinance will be to maintain Eiesland Slough in its natural, pristine, wildlife welcoming state today and for the future. Not all bodies of water can accommodate motorized watercraft and this is one of them.
